

Kitty Travel Checklist



Before You Go

- **Cat Chauffeur Pod:** A carrier sturdy enough to withstand claws, sass, and existential dread.
 - **Comfort crap:** Toss in a blanket that smells like home so your cat doesn't file a complaint.
 - **Vet gossip session:** Shots up to date? Ask your vet about anti-nausea meds... or tiny cat cocktails (kidding).
